He'll be bringing handouts so that you can try some of his favorite recipes yourself at home. Among the many recipes, there is one for making hide glue, another for Linda's honing lubricant, a veneer flattening solution, a very old recipe for milk paint, and techniques for "aging" wood.

At the October meeting, Mark Dauplaise, Ron's son, provided a DVD he made about the manufacturing operations of Pearson Composites, a premium sailboat maker located in Warren, Rhode Island.

The video covered mostly the process of laminating, bending, and forming the wood trim that goes around the portholes and hatches. Seat construction and inlaid table tops were also covered.

Large shaper cutters (router bits on steroids) are used to round the corners of support framing of heads (bathrooms) and cabinets. Techniques and procedures shown in the video can be applied to some of our own wood projects or to trigger some new ideas for other projects.
